BOOK PROJECT

Reading in Talking Books: Theories of Race and Reading from Nineteenth Century America

Reading in Talking Books suspends the assumption that to read is always to participate in a process of liberal self-formation. Instead, the project begins with a challenge to Americanist theories of reading that neglect the ways U.S. racial formations scaffold our most persistent beliefs about the uses of reading. From the fantasy of the ideal (white) reader, to the belief that reading is a self-improving act; from preoccupations with critical reading, to assertions that literacy is the key to liberation; the stories we tell about reading in America are intimately connected with the idealization of whiteness by U.S. institutions. By examining archival sources, scenes of reading from fiction, and autobiographical literacy narratives, *Reading in Talking Books* asks what theories of reading could look like if we divested the value of literacy from the privileges of democratic participation. Invoking early African American writers' use of the "talking book" trope the project seeks a maximalist definition of reading that accounts for manifold relations between people and texts.
