BOOK MANUSCRIPT

Tales from Du Bois: The Queer Intimacy of Cross-Caste Romance (SUNY Press) offers novel readings of Du Bois's rich literary repertoire, analyzing Du Bois's deployment of a trope I term the "cross-caste romance" as the principal structuring device for his literary works. I define "cross-caste romance" as a bond that is sentimental, conjugal, or erotic, projected across lines of purportedly immutable difference. By examining key texts including The Souls of Black Folk, Darkwater, and Dark Princess, as well as examples from Du Bois's forgotten works of genre fiction, I show how cross-caste romance deconstructs conventional parameters of Black subjectivity and community. An inter-personal relation with socio-political import, the cross-caste romance—whether enabled or disabled—places into relief the fragility of empathic recognition between a "self" and an "other." Drawing on critical race theory, philosophy, feminist and queer theory, and structural analysis, this book examines the possibilities for an intersectional, anti-racist form of Afro-American politics in the literary work of a major intellectual of the twentieth-century.
